

Alberta Health Services works with parents, schools & community agencies to provide a range of coordinated health services for school age children and their families. Our common goal is to improve students' health & learning outcomes. A variety of health services are provided.

Nursing

Immunizations

Registered Nurses and Licensed Practical Nurses provide immunizations to students in schools, with parent/guardian consent.

- Grades 1: Immunization records are reviewed, and parents/guardians are notified if their children are due for any vaccines
- Grade 6: Hepatitis B & Human Papillomavirus immunizations
- Grade 9: Diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough) immunization booster & meningococcal immunization
- Students in other grades may be immunized with parent/guardian consent

Kindergarten children aged 4 to 6 are recommended to have their preschool immunizations at the Public Health Centre.

Promoting Health

Registered Nurses work with school staff & families to:

- support teachers with their core health education curriculum, such as sexuality, hygiene, and body image
- provide health resources
- link children/families with community agencies & resources, such as vision and hearing concerns
- promote health in areas, such as, healthy eating, active living, positive mental health, injury prevention, dental health, sexual health, tobacco/addictions prevention and reduction

Communicable Disease Control Registered Nurses provide:

- communicable disease consultation
- infection control consultation
- communicable disease follow-up for students

Dental/Oral Health

In all schools:

- Kindergarten to Grade 3 Oral Health lesson plans and education resources are available at <http://www.albertahealthservices.ca/services/Page13173.aspx>
- Grade 4 to 6 Oral Health lesson plans and education resources are available from the school nurse.

In designated schools:

- Dental screenings and fluoride varnish applications for kindergarten to Grade 2 students
- Dental Sealant applications for Grade 1 and 2 students
- Follow-up with parents for urgent concerns

Allied Health

Children and youth are eligible for service if they have a newly identified medical or neurodevelopmental condition, or if they have experienced a significant change in function due to injury, medical intervention, surgery, or illness.

Child and family-centred services focus on:

- Functional needs
- Meaningful participation at home and in the community
- Supporting transitions through life and developmental stages
- Information sharing and wayfinding supports
- Health promotion and injury prevention

Service providers include:

- Speech-language pathologists
- Occupational therapists
- Physiotherapists
- Audiologists
- Therapy assistants
